Among the judges were City Manager Jonathan Blanton, Museum Manager & Downtown Coordinator Stephanie Thornsbury, and Lumber River Council of Governments: Family Caregiver Resource Specialist Rochelle Hodgnett

25 senior citizens, 3 senior center staff members, our intern from RCC, and Title V participant, 3 judges, and 3 from the Police Department were in attendance for the event that started at 12 noon. Fun facts & upcoming announcements were read to participants as the judges sampled the chili. Great chili should look good, smell good and taste even better. Each cup of chili was judged on 5 criteria to arrive at one whole-number score or 1 to 10, with 10 being the highest.

The 5 criteria were Aroma, Texture, Color, Taste, Aftertaste/Bite. There was bean-less chili, chili that included beef, onions, green & red peppers, mushrooms, carrots, spicy & non-spicy.

The senior center director, Nikki Sewell, prepared a huge pot of chili for

seniors to ensure there was enough for everyone to have a bowl or two. This pot wasn't part of the contest.

Judging took place in the seclusion of the senior center sunroom. Once the judges were finished, everyone was allowed to get in line and enjoy one or all of the chili along with a variety of toppings at our chili bar. These toppings included sour cream, cheese, green onions, cilantro, and crackers."

I would like to make this a tradition with our servicemen. I plan to challenge them next year for a rematch".

Love is in the Air

February, is a month known for lovers and for loving connections, but Valentine's Day, can be a sad and lonely time for many who are not connected to their loved ones and are in fact lonely. Loneliness brings its own dangers. Studies have shown associations with higher blood pressure, with nursing home admissions, with risky health behaviors such as inactivity or smoking, and with dementia.

Researchers at the University of California, San Francisco,

followed 1,600 participants whose average age was 71. They found that those who reported loneliness were more likely to develop difficulties with activities of daily living. Even when the study controlled for socioeconomic status and health, the lonely had higher mortality. Nearly 23 percent died within six years, compared with 14 percent of those who weren't lonely.



These statistics and similar research findings have driven the Shepherd's Center of Greater Winston-Salem's Vital Living Program for years, and this Valentine's Day was no exception.

After all, what may be lonelier than a Valentine's Day with no one to celebrate?

We thought so, too, and generated a party for ears, eyes and taste buds. We called it "Love is in the Air," and we promised it to be a "fun" raiser as well as a fundraiser for Triad Harmony Express: The Men's Show Chorus of the Triad, its chapter quartets and the newly formed, Shepherd's Center Singers. Since we were combining efforts, we chose to add an opportunity to advocate for our senior centers as well!

The newly created Shepherd's Center Singers began just last

November with Carmina Jenks directing. She "moonlights" as Music Director of Salem College's Community Music Program here in Winston. The Shepherd's Center Singers were formed for the pure fun of it. Yet, three months later, they suddenly found themselves performing for their first public appearance on Saturday, February 11th. They were great!

There were two shows: a

matinee at 3:00pm and an evening option at 6:30pm. Between performances participants enjoyed delicious pairings of sumptuous chocolates and gourmet coffees donated by area coffee houses and local chocolatiers. Tickets went on sale for \$15 each. With an attendance of 176, we collected over \$1500 which was split between the two choruses.

As part of its effort to provide professional development, training, and various other valuable tools for senior center professionals throughout the state, the North Carolina Senior Center Alliance (NCSCA) is launching a new Senior Center Resource Library.

The goal of this site is to provide valuable resources and tools specifically for senior center professionals to gather information (from one central location)for both SCOPE Certification and NCOA/NISC Accreditation; as well as, many other areas.

The site is divided into 8 topic areas.

- 1. <u>Executive/Administration</u> this includes examples of mission statements, goals & objectives, action plans, strategic plans, annual reports, etc
- 2. <u>Marketing & Community Connections</u> this includes examples of organization newsletters, marketing policies/plans, information referral services/I & A, cooperative agreements (MOU's), and various other marketing materials
- 3. <u>Personnel & Human Resources</u> this includes examples of organizational charts, volunteer

handbooks, volunteer plans, staff handbooks, personnel policy

- 4. <u>Program Planning</u> this area includes examples of budget worksheets, program planning philosophy, trip policies, program reports, and various others
- 1. <u>Policy and Procedures</u> (coming soon) this area will include miscellaneous policies and procedures such as computer lab, fitness center, incident report, budget procedures, emergency procedures,

participation forms and other common ones needed at our senior centers and found in policy and procedure manuals

- 2. <u>Evaluation</u> (coming soon) this area will include examples of various evaluation tools including annual satisfaction, program satisfaction,
- outcome based, interest survey, and other areas for evaluation
- 3. <u>Facility Operations</u> (coming soon) this area will include evacuation routes, rental policies, housekeeping, preventative maintenance, safety procedures, and related material
- 4. <u>Fundraising & Sponsorship</u> (coming soon) this area will include examples of how various senior centers do this to include both programs, special events, packages, and policy



In addition to these key topic areas complete with specific examples from various senior centers in the state, the site will also include a collection of training and leadership videos at the users' disposal. New ones will be added to the site as we move

forward.

The resource library can be accessed under the <u>Mentoring & Training</u> heading. If you or your agency is not a member, registration is easy. From the NCSCA home page, click on the <u>"Join"</u> button at top of page and follow the instructions once you are directed to the NCAOA page.

Individual registration is \$10 per year and agency registration is \$30 per year.

You do not have to be a NCAOA member to become a NCSCA member. Your registration can be paid online with PayPal or credit card.

The Senior Center Resource Library has plenty more to come in the future and is only a click away so I encourage all current members to check it out and for any non-members to highly consider joining NCSCA to gain access to this wonderful tool. Sincerely.
